- **SDG-5**, led by Divyansh Singh and Samyukta Menon, tackled **gender equality**, pushing for actionable ideas to empower women and girls globally.
- The International Press, managed by Paurushi Mahar (journalism) and Sreevishnu Nag (photography), reported committee proceedings while reflecting on the broader influence of media and photojournalism in shaping global narratives.

To ensure delegates were well-prepared and supported, the school offered virtual masterclasses, comprehensive study guides, four-course lunches, high tea, a Delegate Bash, and official certificates and trophies. These thoughtful additions, combined with an experienced executive board, enhanced the quality of the conference and maintained an atmosphere of decorum and respect.
